The third annual session of the NORTHEAST INSTITUTE OF ALCOHOL STUDIES, co-sponsored by the official State Alcoholism Programs of nine Northeastern States, will be held on the campus of Rutgers - The State University, New Brunswick, New Jersey, June 19 to 24, 1966.

The Institute provides a general overview of problems of alcohol and alcoholism for board members of official and voluntary agencies, civic leaders, and others without special training or experience in this field; and for persons with professional qualifications who have little acquaintance with the field, or who are unable to devote more than a week to such study.

The Institute's coverage is indicated by the program of lectures, each to be followed by discussion:

- Alcohol and science
- Alcohol problems and programs
- Psychological effects of alcohol
- Nature and etiology of alcoholism
- Alcoholism and the family
- Treatment and rehabilitation services
- Adolescents and alcohol
- Religion and alcohol
- Is prevention of alcohol possible?
- Community attitudes and interpretation to the community
- Some newer approaches
- Coordinated action

Small group discussion sessions will be organized around the following subject areas:
